



Solar Village

The Land Art Generator Initiative (LAGI) 2025 challenges designers to create renewable energy landscapes for the village of Marou, Fiji. Situated between land and sea, this unique site demands a design that addresses the village's energy and water needs and also honors the cultural and ecological significance of its setting. The goal is to supply clean and reliable electricity and drinking water to the coastal village's 67 households, support sustainable tourism, and help build a resilient and thriving future for generations to come.

Our vision

The concept is grounded in the real needs of the local community, with a strong focus on feasibility and long-term resilience.

Marou is a small village located in the Yasawa Islands, part of the Fiji archipelago.

The village is made up of a small community of just 67 households, who face significant challenges due to the island's harsh weather conditions.

Beyond energy production, the community has other needs, such as shaded public spaces, agricultural development, educational infrastructure, and shelters against severe storms. Family, community, and respect for nature are central values in daily life, upheld by iTaukei traditions such as the Kava ceremony and the Meke dance.
