



The aim of the project is that the surface covered by the solar panels should not only be a source of energy, but also a valuable community space. Reflecting the agricultural culture, the solar farm will be transformed into a community garden, including growing areas, water catchments and energy systems organised around a central building. From a distance, the structure nestled into the hillside looks more like a flower or butterfly than a built mass. The formal design and colour scheme of the main building evokes the world of local tapa patterns, but is also based on an open, communal reimagining. Local people decide what is grown on the plots, making the system seasonally and culturally flexible. The goal is not to hand over a finished building, but to create a collectively shaped space that truly becomes part of the community.
